

Here you can find some tips to help you in your reading sessions.

1

Look at the cover of the book. What do you think *pampered* means? (being looked after in a very careful way and spoiled) Read the first section. What do you think of Prince Dev's behaviour? What do we learn about Dev when he throws the vase? (that he doesn't think about other people)

2

Find verbs that describe what Prince Dev does when he has his tantrum, for example: *shouted, hurled, roared, stomped*. What does his mother do? (She just sighs.) What do you think she should do? (perhaps make him apologise to the servant, pick up the broken vase, go to his room)

3

Read to the break. Find three more verbs that show that Dev is still cross, for example: *prowled, snapping, glared*. What do you think the word *prowled* makes Dev sound like? (a caged, wild animal) What changes Dev's mood? (He looks through the gates at all the things outside.)

4

There is a real contrast between the rich, quiet garden and the noisy street. Find all the different things that Dev sees. Reread the description of the peanut seller. How is he different from Dev? (He is poor and dirty and has to work.) How is he the same? (He looks exactly like Dev.)

5

Which words tell you that Dev is surprised when he sees the boy? (*stared, eyes grew wide*) How could the peanut seller be important in the story? (Perhaps he could become friends with the prince; perhaps he and the prince could swap places.) Read to the end of the chapter.

6

What can we learn about the strange man? (He is dressed like a magician, he can control the guards, he is very powerful, he is a stranger.) How might he be dangerous? (He might be able to take over the kingdom, he might put a spell on Prince Dev's father, he might be unstoppable.)

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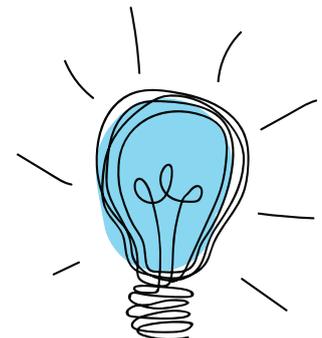



Discuss which of the three options you find most interesting to continue the story and why. Here's a reminder of the options and some key points for each one:

What should Prince Dev do next?

A

Run out of the palace gates while he has the chance

Is this Prince Dev's only chance of escape? Should he take the opportunity while he can? But should he warn his parents about the mysterious stranger? Could they be in danger otherwise?

B

Follow the mysterious stranger into the palace

If Prince Dev follows the stranger into the palace, he might be able to help his parents. But will he miss the chance to escape the palace grounds? Is it more important to warn his parents?

C

Wait for the stranger to return and follow him when he leaves

This might be a chance for Prince Dev to discover more about the mysterious stranger, but it does not help his parents. What will happen if the stranger doesn't come out for a long time?
