Recap on the events of Chapter 3. Ask a volunteer to explain the situation at the end of the chapter. (Bolts has caught hold of Christian; Frances, Bray and Alfie are in the tent.) Read up to "How dare you?" Bolts seethed. How does Christian feel at the beginning? (He is cross with himself, but surprised that Bolts will cause harm.) Ask the children to find words that capture how unpleasant Bolts is, for example: sneered, loser, glared menacingly, seethed.

Ask: How is Rees brave in this situation? Discuss how he might not want to stand up to Bolts in the middle of a forest, knowing how violent Bolts can be. Ask: What is the first indication that Rees might be turning against Bolts. (He doesn't grin.) What impression does the word 'barked' give of Cathryn? (That she is cross, that she is a bit dangerous, too.) Read on to *"Bolts, don't."* Ask: Why has Christian decided that he doesn't want to scare Bolts?

Read up to, "Please don't kill me," he whispered. How does Christian feel here? Agree that the surprise of the bear goes perfectly - Bolts cries and is terrified - but that Christian doesn't enjoy it. Why is that? (He's not a bully.) Find vocabulary that creates drama in this section: grabbed, almighty roar, gasped, lunged, backed up against a tree, watching in horror, whimpered, quivering. Ask the children to compare Bolts in this passage with the Bolts at the beginning of the chapter.

Read to the end of the story. Ask: What do you think Bolts thought when he looked back over his shoulder and saw Christian running with Bray? Speculate that he probably thought that Christian was still trying to scare him. Ask: Why does Bolts fall in the river? (He is too busy looking back at the bear and steps off the path.) Find phrases that create the sense of Bolts' desperate fall, for example: *slipped*, *tumbled*, *grasped*, *desperately*, *falling too fast*. Read up to ...the direction that Bolts had fled. Ask: Why did Frances have to be asked so many times to tell Bray to stop? Discuss suggestions, for example, she felt that Bolts deserved to be taught a lesson, she knew Bray wasn't dangerous. Ask: What impression does the phrase *lumbered amiably* give of Bray? (gentle, relaxed, large) Ask: Why does Christian decide to run after Bolts? (He is worried about Bolts; Bolts is in shock; he feels responsible; he is a kind person.)

Together find all the different vocabulary used to describe Bolts in the water and the river itself, for example: *splashed, spinning around, black water*. Ask: what makes the river dangerous? (the current, the cold, Bolts can't swim) Point out that added drama is created by the noise, the panic and the fact that Bolts disappears and reappears. Ask the children to speculate on what might happen in the last chapter. What might happen to Bray? Will Bolts change his ways?
