### Chapter 5: Whhooaaaa!

- 1. What does the author mean when he writes: 'The sea began to bubble and boil'? How do you see this in your mind?
- 2. What was making the two clicking noises?
- 3. Why couldn't the Silly Sally sail away from the giant crab?
- 4. How did one half of the crew feel when the *Silly Sally* was being spun around? How did the other half feel?
- 5. What was the strange creature covered with?
- 6. How big were the prawn's eyes? How long were its feelers? What are feelers?
- 7. What does the prawn tell the crab that it shouldn't do with its food?
- 8. Why doesn't the Giant Prawn want to go to the theme park?
- 9. What was the first thing that the prawn brought up from the seabed?
- 10. How did the prawn fix the ship's sails?



### **Writing Activities**

Imagine you are a member of the crew onboard the *Silly Sally*. You are writing a letter home to tell everyone about your adventures.

Retell the story of *Captain Jellybeard and the Giant South Sea prawn* as a letter home. Don't forget to describe the different scenes, and the weather conditions. Say how you felt when the adventures were taking place.

In 100 words, describe what the Giant South Sea Prawn looks like.

You can use some of the descriptions from the text, but add your own ideas, too, for example what colour it is and how many legs it has.

What would you do if someone gave you a chest full of gold? In 100 words write what you would do with all that money.

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### Other Extension Activities

### Drama Activity – Hot seating

Choose your favourite character from Captain Jellybeard and the Giant South Sea Prawn and pretend to be him or her. Sit on a chair as the character while other pupils ask you questions. You can make up the answer if you don't know it! Swap over so that other pupils can be hot-seated as different characters.

#### **Art Activities**

Draw a picture of the Giant South Sea Prawn. Use the descriptions in the text and add some of your own. Label your picture with the different parts of the prawn. Add a tiny *Silly Sally* to your picture to show how big the prawn is.

Make your own puppets and act out your favourite part of Captain

Jellybeard and the Giant South Sea Prawn. You could make spoon,

finger, shadow or hand puppets and decorate them with paint, string,

foil or anything else that you like. Make a short film of your puppet

show to share with other classes.



Make your own Giant South Sea Prawn out of papier mâché. Re-read the description in chapter 5 and look online for pictures of prawns to help with your design.


### **Picture Resources**

The sea monster in this picture is called a kraken.


Do you know what a kraken is? Does the kraken really exist?

This picture shows lots of different deep-sea creatures.




Can you label each one? (You might have to do some research on the Internet to help you.)
