- **Text Questions:** In this section, you will find questions about the chapter. These can be used orally in guided or shared reading discussions, as an independent comprehension exercise, or as part of a written homework or reading club activity.

Text Questions

Chapter 1: Once Upon A Time

- 1. Did you enjoy reading the first chapter of Prince Charming and his Quest for a Wife? Did you think the chapter was funny? Which part did you like best?
- 2. How does the queen know where to find Prince Charming at the start of the chapter?
- 3. Why is Prince Charming feeling glum? How does the queen feel about this?
- 4. "When your father was your age, he had already defeated an army of ogres, killed five dragons, and married me," the Queen tutted. Why does the queen say this to Prince Charming? What is she suggesting? How does the prince react?
- 5. How does Prince Charming feel about his mother's decision that he must find a wife?
- Why does Prince Charming plod along slowly on Harold?
 TEACHER NOTE: Harold was old and the prince's armour was heavy.
- 7. What does Rumpelstiltskin look like? **TEACHER NOTE:** He had straggly hair, purple warts and pointed teeth.
- 8. Why is Prince Charming worried about talking to the imp? TEACHER NOTE: He was uneasy as his parents had wisely told him never to speak to strangers.



- 9. How does the prince know Rumpelstiltskin's name? How does the imp feel about this?
- 10. Can you remember what the models inside Rumpelstiltskin's three glass jars were? What do you think they might mean?
- 11. Why does Rumpelstiltskin tap his foot at the end of the chapter?



Making the Choice and Voting

Which jar should Prince Charming pick? The one containing...

Option 1: the snowflake and rosy red apple

What do you think this model might mean? Can you think of a fairytale that has the word 'Snow' and a rosy red apple in it? What do you think will happen if Prince Charming chooses this option? Who might he meet? Do you think he will find his true love?

Option 2: the pink castle covered in ivy

Which fairytale character do you think Prince Charming might meet if the readers choose this option? What do you think she will be like? Remember that this is a topsy-turvy world. How might the damsel be different from what we expect? Do you think Prince Charming will find his true love?

Option 3: the tower with something yellow hanging down the side

Who do you think Prince Charming will find at this tower? Can you think of any female fairytale characters who live in a tower? What do you think the damsel might be like? Do you think she will fall in love with Prince Charming?



Writing Activities

Write three words to describe Prince Charming in a traditional fairytale.

Now write three words to describe the character of Prince Charming in this story. Are the words the same or different? Discuss your words with a partner.

What do you think Prince Charming looks like? Write a description of this character based on what you have learned about him so far. Try to use lots of adjectives in your description.



Other Extension Activities

Art Activity

Draw a picture of Prince Charming in a scene from the story. You could draw him sleeping in the throne, or plodding along on Harold the horse.

Write a description of Prince Charming to go with your picture.

Drama Activity

Prince Charming has been glum ever since Cinderella left him. The queen tells us that Cinderella left because the prince would not buy her a new pair of shoes. What sort of conversation might Prince Charming and Cinderella have had before she left? What arguments might Cinderella have made for having some new shoes? What arguments might the prince have made against buying them? Discuss your ideas with a friend. Then act out the conversation between Prince Charming and Cinderella.

Research Activity

Have you ever heard of the character Rumpelstiltskin before? Find out about this imp who likes to make deals and trades. What is similar or different about the character in Prince Charming and his Quest for a Wife, compared to traditional stories?



Key Words and Phrases

Here is a list of interesting or potentially unfamiliar vocabulary used in the latest chapter of Prince Charming and his quest for a Wife: plodding, napping, stormed through the door, swept out of the room, tapping his foot with impatience, odd.

You may wish to explore this vocabulary with your pupils, to aid their understanding of the chapter and enhance, or 'up level', the quality of their own writing.

appeared - came into sight

Worksheet: Sentences

Do you know the difference between a statement, a question and an exclamation?

A **statement** tells you something: The prince was napping on the royal throne.

A **question** asks you something: What do I have to do?

An **exclamation** exclaims about something: But she already had 100 pairs!

Always remember that a sentence needs to start with a capital letter and end with a full stop, question mark or exclamation mark.

This is an illustration of a traditional prince character from a



What sort of model might you find in the jar to represent him or her?


Draw the model inside this glass jar.
