#### **Text Questions**

#### Chapter 4: What a Beauty!

- Why was the palace bathed in a warm pink glow?
  **TEACHER NOTE:** because the rising sun was shining on the building
- 2. What does Prince Charming hope to find inside the palace? Does he find it?
- 3. What does the prince do before he knocks on the palace door? Why do you think he does this? TEACHER NOTE: The prince climbed down from his saddle. He quickly polished his armour. Then he strode up to the large door.
- 4. Why does Prince Charming say that his name is Chince Parming?
- 5. What does the word 'Belle' mean in the French language?
- How does Harold feel about Prince Charming flirting with bell at the front door? How do we know this?
   TEACHER NOTE: [The prince] fluttered his eyelashes.
   Belle giggled and blushed.
   Harold rolled his eyes and snorted.
- 7. Why does the prince gobble the breakfast food hungrily? TEACHER NOTE: he has only eaten some jelly babies since leaving his own castle the day before.
- 8. What makes Prince Charming realise that Belle is not his true love? What does he see around the dining room? How does he feel about this?



- 9. What mean suggestion does Belle make about Harold? How does Prince Charming feel about this?
- 10. Who makes a dramatic entrance into the dining room? Were you expecting to see this character? How does he feel about Prince Charming's visit? How does Belle react when he says she is his girlfriend? Did you find this part of the story amusing?
- 11. What 2 names does Belle mistakenly call the prince? Why are they funny? Do you know what the word 'smarmy' means?
  TEACHER NOTE: Prince Smarming and Prince Charmless
- 12. What decision does Prince Charming make at the end of the chapter? Were you surprised by this? Do you think the prince is doing the right thing?



#### Making the Choice and Voting

#### What speedy mode of transport does Prince Charming choose?

#### **Option 1: A pumpkin carriage**

Do you think this sounds like a fun mode of transport? Which fairytale features a pumpkin carriage? Who might pull the carriage? Do you think the prince will get to Cinderella quickly if he uses this mode of transport? Would you like to find out? Can you think of any fun, amusing or magical things that might happen if he chooses this mode of transport?

#### **Option 2:** A magic broomstick

Why do you think there might be a magic broomstick outside the Beast's palace? Who might have brought or left it there? Can you think of any characters we have already met in this story who might reappear? Would you like to see them again? Do you think Prince Charming and Harold would travel well on a magic broomstick? Would you like to find out?

#### **Option 3: A flying carpet**

Do you think this would be a fun mode of transport for the prince and Harold? Would you like to see them flying through the air on a magic carpet? Which fairytale features a magic carpet? Do you think this would be a speedy way to get to Cinderella? Would you like to find out?



## Writing Activities

Write a longer description of the palace where Belle and the Beast live. Make a list of words that you might like to use before you start. Remember that the palace is very beautiful – nicer even than Prince Charming's own castle! **TEACHER NOTE:** vocabulary list provided

Write a profile of the character, Belle. Write about her appearance (what she looks like), her personality and her likes and dislikes. Then write your opinion of this character. **TEACHER NOTE:** template provided

What do you think might have happened at the palace after Prince Charming left? Write down your ideas. Then use your notes to write a short story featuring Belle and the Beast.

#### Art Activity

# **Discussion Activities**

Belle says mean things about animals. She does mean things to them because she thinks it is fun. This upsets Prince Charming. In a group discuss what you think about cruelty to animals. What types of things do you think are cruel? Why do you think it is important for people to be kind to animals? Britain is known as a nation of animal lovers. Why do you think this is?

When Prince Charming meets Belle, he thinks she is the most beautiful woman in the world. But, when he gets to know her he decides that she isn't really pretty at all. Why is this? In a group, discuss what makes other people like you. What important traits should a good friend have? Do you think appearance (how someone looks) is important?
