

Guided reading notes

Here you can find some tips to help you in your reading sessions in class.

1

Read the first two paragraphs. Ask: Who usually watches Colin's shows? (Billy and some dogs) Ask: How does Colin introduce his show? Agree that *Ladies and Gentlemen* is a bit grand and that it is unlikely to be *THE most exciting display*. Clarify the word 'exclusive'. Ask: do you think this location is exclusive?

2

Read to the end of the section (up to ... and off they rode.). Enjoy the joke in doubled in number. Ask: What clues tell you that the man and his horse are from a different world? (For example: the man's clothes, the size of the horse.) Look at the book cover. Ask: What sort of book do you think this is going to be?

3

Read up to "...Colin!" the audience chanted. Ask: How does Colin feel when he first arrives in Normshire? (terrified) Ask: Why? Together, find clues that Colin is no longer in our world. (The houses and villagers look medieval, there is a 'giant', the villagers believe Colin is performing real magic.)

4

Ask: How do we know that the villagers are impressed by Colin's trick? (They gasp and chant his name.) Read to the end. Locate: "For my next trick, wait what?" Colin spluttered. Discuss the meaning of 'spluttered'. Ask: Why does Colin splutter? (He has just understood what the villagers have said.)

5

Ask the children, in pairs, to work out the meaning of the word 'menaced'. Ask: What is a dark wizard? Together, think of other good names for a bad wizard, such as Bloodwin the Terrible. Together, find phrases that fit with the medieval setting. (For example: Hail, foretell the card, Logan speaks no lies.)

6

Ask a volunteer to explain why Logan has brought Colin to Normshire, inferring additional events. Challenge the children to find phrases in the story that will have made Logan think that Colin is a real wizard. Ask: Do you think that Colin will have saved the villagers by the end of the story?



Discuss the options

Discuss in class which of the three options you find most interesting to continue the story and why. Here's a reminder of the options and some key points for each one:

What does Colin do?



Try to convince them he has no magic powers

The villagers seem convinced that Colin is a wizard, and he has been happy to perform for them. Do you think they will believe he has no magic powers, or will they just think he is scared of Grimdok?



Run away

Remember, Colin closed his eyes on the ride to the village, and they rode for over an hour. He might not be able to get home, but perhaps he could run somewhere safer, away from Grimdok?



Pretend that he is a real wizard to Grimdok

We have been told that Grimdok is a menacing dark wizard. But we have only heard this from the villagers, and they also believe Colin is a real wizard! Perhaps Grimdok is not that bad?

Discussion activity

In pairs or a small group, share descriptions of the settings in chapter one of *Tricks*. You could use your WRITE worksheet to help your discussion.

Do you have the same impression of Colin's neighbourhood and the medieval village? Do you think the two settings work well together? Do you think we might travel between the two settings more as the story goes on, or will we stay in the village?
