

Guided reading notes

Here you can find some tips to help you in your reading sessions in class.

1

Recap on the situation at the end of the last chapter. Remember also the voting options from last week. Read the first paragraph. Ask: What do you think the fluffy thing might be? (possibly a rabbit) Why might a magician have a hidden pocket? Speculate on its uses. (to hide things in)

2

Read to ...he was gone. Ask: How does Colin persuade Grimdok to open the tin? (He makes out that Grimdok is too scared.) Share a video of a magician opening a tin of snakes. Ask a volunteer to demonstrate a 'dramatic flourish'. Ask: Why does he do this? (to create atmosphere and anticipation)

3

Ask: Why does Grimdok leave after opening the tin? Which phrase tells you this? (*frozen in fear*) What does this mean? (too scared to move) Read to ... boomed Logan. Ask: Did Colin really read Grimdok's mind? (No - he was just lucky.) Why is Grimdok scared of snakes? (The venom can defeat him.)

4

Ask: Why does Grimdok wear a snakeskin coat? (to hide the fact that he is frightened of snakes) Ask: What do the villagers think of Colin? Agree that they think that Colin is a real magician who has read Grimdok's mind and found his weakness.

5

Read to the end of the chapter. List ways in which Grimdok is a typical evil magician, for example: he makes a face in the sky, he has an army of the undead, he plans to destroy innocent villagers, he wears a snakeskin coat.

Ask: Who has tried and failed to defeat Grimdok? (twelve previous champions)

6

Ask: How can Colin defeat Grimdok?
Agree that it will help that the villagers believe in him, but he will have to be very clever as well and make something really happen through trickery. Ponder together what he could do, for example, he could find some real snake venom, perhaps.



Discuss the options

Discuss in class which of the three options you find most interesting to continue the story and why. Here's a reminder of the options and some key points for each one:

What should Colin do?



Convince everyone to abandon the village

How can Colin convince them all to leave? Will he tell the truth that he is not really magical, or will he make up a story? Do you think the villagers would agree to leave, and where might they go?



Train the villagers in magic

What magic can Colin train the villagers in when he is not really magical himself? Perhaps he could make use of Grimdok's snake venom weakness as part of their training.



Try to think of one really good trick to beat Grimdok

We now know about Grimdok's weakness, and perhaps Colin can think up another snake-based trick? Or perhaps he has another trick up his sleeve. What might that be?

Character role play

In pairs or a small group, choose a character each and role play a conversation between you, pretending to be those characters.

You could choose Grimdok and Colin when the snakes leap out of the tin, or Logan and the villagers when Grimdok threatens to return, or any characters of your choice.
