Vocabulary: warm, blend, mix, line, tone, colours,
primary colours colours from which all other colours can be made by mixing. (blue, red, yellow)
secondary colour a colour made by mixing two primary colours (orange, green, purple).

Non naturalistic colours Colours which do not appear naturally
Foreground the part of a view that is nearest to the observer,
middle ground, the middle distance of a painting
background, the part of a picture that appears furthest from the viewer.
abstract,
emotion,
a strong feeling or mood
Expressionism an art and cultural movement of the 20th century
Expressionist an artist who tries to express a feeling with what they create. Colours and shapes are not used in a way people see them, but as the artist feels them
